#### FOREWORD

The National Board of the Civil Air Patrol expressed the desire that all uniform clothing articles which are no longer authorized for wear by members of the U.S. Air Force be phased out as articles of CAP uniform as soon as practical.

In furtherance of the National Board's decision, the National Executive Committee of the Civil Air Patrol established 31 December 1967 as the date on which such articles will no longer be worn.

This manual implements the decision of these governing bodies by prescribing only Air Force approved clothing items as articles of the CAP uniform. It is effective as soon as practical following receipt.

For the first time, we have used "Decision Logic Tables" to describe the wear of the uniform. These tables are now being employed extensively by both industry and government. The tables are designed in a format to help the reader select pertinent information more quickly. One part of the table describes the situation that exists ("if" column) and the other part ("then" column) describes the action the reader must take for that particular situation. For example, using Table 2-3, we can quickly determine the correct wear of any authorized uniform item as follows: "If" the item is a utility shirt, described as green, shade OG 107, long sleeve, "then" it will be worn inside trouser's and the undershirt may be exposed at the neckline.

## Chapter I

## GENERAL INFORMATION

#### 1-1. Policy:

- a. It is not necessary that CAP members wear a uniform, but when the uniform is worn members will adhere to the rules prescribed in this manual.
- b. Civil Air Patrol members are authorized to wear a uniform similar to the Air Force uniform, the difference being that distinctive emblems, buttons, insignia, and badges are employed to identify the wearer as a member of CAP. These differences from the Air Force uniform are as prescribed by the National Commander of CAP with the approval of Headquarters USAF.
- c. Various combinations of uniforms are authorized herein in order to allow for various climatic conditions, availability of uniforms, etc., but no member is expected to equip himself with all or even a major part of the combinations described in this manual. The minimum basic uniform for male and female seniors and cadets which will satisfy most occasions is listed below. Members may obtain and wear other uniforms authorized in this manual on an optional basis. The National Commander and other commanders may specify the wearing of a particular uniform type for the purpose of achieving a uniform appearance at squadron, group, wing, regional, and national functions. All commanders must be mindful of the objective of attaining a neatly uniformed group at a minimum of personal expense to the members; consequently, they will refrain from imposing unreasonable uniform requirements. It is a member's personal responsibility to equip himself with a proper uniform. Commanders may assist if they have the capability, through use of unit funds, donations, or by acquiring surplus uniforms. Cadets will not be required to purchase the blue uniform. A commander may require cadets to wear this uniform only if the purchase is voluntary or the uniform has been supplied without expense to the cadets.

- d. Variations from the uniforms, uniform combinations, and insignia contained in this manual are not authorized. Exceptions, if any, for national events will be contained in separate directives from National Headquarters.
- 1-2. When The Uniform Is Worn. The service uniform is worn when engaged in normal duties as a CAP member. It is worn while attending local, area, or national CAP functions.
- 1-3. When Wear of the Uniform Is Prohibited. CAP members will not wear the uniform:
- a. At any meeting or demonstration carried out or sponsored by an organization, association, movement, group, or combination of persons that:
- (1) The Attorney General of the United States has designated as totalitarian, Fascist, Communist, or subversive.
- (2) Advocates or approves the commission of acts of force or violence to deny others their rights under the Constitution of the United States.
- (3) Seeks to alter the form of the United States Government by unconstitutional means.
- b. Under any circumstances that would tend to bring discredit or reproach upon the uniform.
  - c. When engaged in civilian employment.
- 1-4. Dress and Appearance. Each member of the CAP must be well-groomed and assure that his personal appearance at all times reflects credit upon himself and the CAP. Each will meet the following minimum requirements when in uniform:
- a. Appearance of Uniform. When uniforms are worn, they must be clean, neat, correct in design and specification, and in good condition. Uniforms will be kept buttoned and shoes must be

shined and in good repair. Metallic insignia, badges, and other metallic devices including the blue service uniform buttons, also must be maintained in the proper luster and condition.

#### b. Personal Appearance - Men:

- (1) The face will be kept clean-shaven, but a short, neatly trimmed mustache may be worn. A beard may be worn only when temporarily approved by medical officials for medical reasons. Such approval will be limited initially to three months, but may be extended if considered necessary by the medical authorities.
- (2) Hair must be neat and closely trimmed. It may be clipped at the edges of the sides and back, but must present an evenly graduated appearance.
- (3) Articles such as pencils, pens, watch chains, fobs, pins, jewelry, handkerchiefs, combs, cigars, cigarettes, pipes, and sunglasses cases will not be worn or carried exposed on the uniform. The wearing of wristwatches, identification bracelets, and rings is permitted. Conservative sunglasses may be worn, but not in military formations.

#### c. Personal Appearance - Women:

- (1) Hair will be neatly arranged and shaped to present a conservative feminine appearance. Hair styles that prevent the proper wearing of the flight cap or service hat are not appropriate. Barrettes, ribbons, and other ornaments, except inconspicuous pins and combs, will not be worn in the hair when the uniform is worn. Hair nets will be worn only when authorized for a specific type of duty. Hair coloring may be used if it looks natural and complements skin tones.
- (2) Cosmetics will be conservative and in good taste.
- (3) Pencils, pens, pins, handkerchiefs, and jewelry will not be worn or carried exposed on the uniform. Wear of earrings is prohibited, but rings may be worn. Conservative sunglasses may be worn, except in military formations.

#### 1-5. Purchase of Uniform Items by Individuals:

- a. Articles of Uniform Clothing. CAP members are authorized to purchase such articles from any of the following sources:
  - (1) Base Exchanges. See CAPR 147-1.
- (2) USAF Clothing Sales Stores. This should be the primary source of uniform clothing for CAP members. The following rules apply:
- (a) To be eligible to purchase from a clothing sales store a member must possess a current membership card. All authorized

purchases in a clothing sales store will be for cash only. All distinctive USAF buttons will be removed from outer garments prior to the sale of such items to CAP personnel. If clothing sales store personnel question their authority to sell to CAP members they should be asked to make reference to Paragraph 51, Volume I, Part 3, AFM 67-1.

- (b) In the event a clothing sales store is not avaibable, purchases may be made by mail order. In such cases, send a Mail Order Requisition (AF Form 662) in duplicate, to Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio 45433, if you live in the Continental United States or Puerto Rico; to FC 5000, Elmendorf AFB, Alaska 99506, if you live in Alaska; or to FC 5260, Hickam AFB, Hawaii 96824, if you live in Hawaii. The requisition must be accompanied by a money order or certified check payable to the Treasurer of the United States. Payment must be for the exact amount of the purchase. If you do not have a current price list, which changes periodically, (AFR 67-57), you should contact your nearest clothing sales store or write to Wright-Patterson AFB. If for some reason your order cannot be completely filled, a government check will be sent for the balance due the person ordering. All postage fees are paid by the government.
- (c) Since certain items are considered common items and may be purchased from commercial sources, the following items are not authorized for sale to CAP members:

Men: Towels, underwear, socks, shoes, and insignia.

Women: Towels, hosiery, and insignia.

- (d) If requisition forms (AF Form 662) are required, the member should contact the unit supply or administrative services officer. Also the forms may be requisitioned from the Director of Administrative Services, National Headquarters, Civil Air Patrol.
- (3) Commercial Sources. When purchasing uniform clothing from commercial sources, the following should be kept in mind:
- (a) All uniform items sold in clothing sales stores conform to Air Force specifications.
- (b) All uniform items sold in base exchanges conform to the specification for either required or optional items. All dress items and accessories must contain the USAF certification label.
- (c) Personnel who purchase uniform items from other sources are advised to establish the reliability of the seller and make sure that each garment purchased contains the certification label shown in (e) below.

- (d) Since clothing sales and base exchanges operate at a low mark up, individuals should be exceedingly cautious about purchasing items from commercial sources at bargain prices. The items offered may have been rejected by Government purchases, fail to conform to specifications, or be in the process of discontinuation as an approved item.
- (e) The purchaser must insure that each uniform item he buys contains the following certification label, sewed permanently to the garment: "USAF CERTIFICATE NO.\_\_\_\_. A sample of this item has been inspected and meets or exceeds the quality prescribed by AF Specification\_\_\_\_." Approved items of optional uniform clothing bearing a previously authorized AMC or ARDC certification label may be worn until no longer serviceable.
- (4) Excess/Surplus Sources. The United States Air Force makes excess and surplus equipment available to the Civil Air Patrol and in some cases this includes uniform clothing articles. Such articles as are made available normally consist of odd sizes or discontinued items. However, it is advisable to check with the CAP unit materiel officer to ascertain if he has access to uniform articles which may fit members of the unit.
- b. Distinctive CAP Insignia and Devices. Distinctive insignia and devices such as the CAP identification badge, collar and lapel insignia, buttons, and other items prescribed herein may be purchased from approved commercial sources

or from the CAP Bookstore. A list of approved commercial sources is contained in CAP Pamphlet 39-1-1. A list of articles handled by the CAP Bookstore, together with prices and ordering instructions, is contained in the current Catalog of Aerospace Education and Training Materials.

- 1-6. Wear of the Uniform in Foreign Countries. Most foreign governments prohibit the wearing of military uniforms by visitors. Personnel will not wear a CAP uniform in a foreign country except for members on orders to participate in the International Air Cadet Exchange or other international events for which National Headquarters has expressly authorized the wearing of the uniform.
- 1-7. Command Responsibility. Commanders will insure that personnel, individually and collectively, present a well-groomed apppearance which will reflect credit upon CAP as an auxiliary of the United States Air Force. They will make certain that personnel are uniformed in accordance with the provisions of this manual; that uniform violations are promptly corrected; and that through inspections, instructional periods, etc., members are informed as to the proper wearing of the uniform.
- 1-8. Definition of Terms. As used in this manual the word "officer" includes all grades from warrant officer through colonel, both senior and cadet. The term "airman", unless otherwise specified, includes all other members withor without grade, both senior and cadet. The term "service uniform" means the tan and blue uniforms worn on normal duty or dress occasions. It excludes fatigue clothing, flying suits, sports clothing, and recreational clothing.

#### Chapter 2

#### UNIFORMS FOR MEN (SENIORS AND CADETS)

#### SECTION A - SERVICE UNIFORMS





Figure 2-1. Examples of Various Uniform Combinations

- 2-1. Uniform Combinations. Uniform combinations 1 through 6, shown in table 2-1, comprise the various CAP service uniforms for men (illustrated by figure 2-1). The "Xs" shown in the vertical columns of the table designate clothing items which must be worn with the various combinations unless otherwise indicated in column C. Combinations are briefly identified as follows:
- a. Combination 1. Lightweight and heavyweight blue service uniforms.
- b. Combination 2. Heavyweight blue service uniform with blue flannel shirt.
- c. Combination 3. Heavyweight blue service trousers with blue flannel shirt and lightweight blue wool/polyester service trousers with blue wool/polyester shirt.
  - d. Combination 4. Tan service uniform.

- e. Combination 5. Tan service shirt with bermuda shorts.
- f. Combination 6. The lightweight and heavyweight blue service uniforms may be worn with white shirt and black bow tie as a semiformal dress uniform.
- 2-2. Special Wear Instructions for Uniform Items. Combinations 3, 4, and 5 may not be worn in establishments where the coat and tie is the normal dress. Combination 6 will be worn on occasions when civilian dinner jacket (tuxedo) is also appropriate.
- 2-3. Fitting Instructions for Uniform Items. See table 2-1.
- 2-4. Description and Materials of Authorized Uniform Items. See table 2-2 for description and materials of clothing items which may be worn with the service uniforms.

TOPCOAT








Figure 2-2. Overcoat, Raincoat, and Topcoat

#### SECTION B - UTILITY UNIFORMS

2-5. General. The work utility uniform as shown in table 2-3 is the authorized CAP utility uniform. The "Xs" shown in the vertical columns of the table designate the items which should be worn with the utility uniforms unless otherwise indicated in column D. Commanders are urged to encourage their personnel to wear these items as soon as they become available. Only those items shown in table 2-3 and 2-4 may be worn

on the utility uniform unless special authority to wear other items is granted by National Headquarters, CAP.

2-6. When the Work Utility Uniform May Be Worn. The work utility uniform may be prescribed for wear while performing duty at the unit training site, while on an actual or practice mission, and when traveling by private vehicle between residence and place of duty.

#### SECTION C - FLYING AND RECREATIONAL CLOTHING

2-7. What May Be Worn. The type of clothing to be worn while flying or engaging in organized recreational activities, in lieu of authorized service uniforms described in this manual, will be as prescribed by wing commanders or by commanders to whom they have delegated this authority. Experience has shown that it is impractical to require uniformity in this type clothing throughout CAP; therefore, National

Headquarters will not prescribe the type of clothing to be worn for these activities. However, any of the uniforms prescribed in Sections A and B of this chapter may be worn while flying. When an Air Force flight suit is worn, it will not be worn off the flight line. The use of cloth badges and grade insignia is encouraged on flight suits and uniforms worn while flying.

#### Chapter 3

#### UNIFORMS FOR WOMEN (SENIOR AND CADET)

#### SECTION A - SERVICE AND FLIGHT UNIFORMS




Figure 3-2. Service and Flight Uniforms

- 3-1. Uniform Combinations. Uniform combinations A through F, shown on table 3-1, comprise the various CAP service and flight uniforms for women (illustrated by figure 3-2). The "Xs" shown in the vertical columns of the table designate clothing items which must be worn with the various combinations unless otherwise indicated in column C. Combinations are briefly identified as follows:
- a. Combination A. Lightweight blue service uniform.
- b. Combination B. Heavyweight blue service uniform.
- c. Combination C. Blue and white striped service uniform (cotton/polyester).
- d. Combination D. Blue and white striped service uniform (cotton).
- e. Combination E. Heavyweight blue flight uniform (wool).
- f. Combination F. Lightweight blue flight uniform (cotton).
- g. Combination G. The lightweight and heavyweight blue service uniforms may be worn with a white shirt as a semiformal dress uniform.

- The shirt must be button down front (3 buttons), yoke back, quarter-length sleeves, and dark blue collar undertabs. Long sleeves and French cuffs or barrel cuffs are optional. The material may be silk, cotton, synthetics, or a blend thereof.
- 3-2. Special Wear Instructions for Uniform Items. See table 3-1.
- 3-3. Fitting Instructions for Uniform Items. See table 3-1.
- 3-4. Wear of Service Uniforms. The blue and the blue and white striped service uniforms are authorized for wear except when prohibited by chapter 1.
- 3-5. Wear of Flight Uniforms. Flight uniforms will be worn only to perform duties that cannot be performed when other uniforms are worn, or to travel on a military aircraft when parachutes are required. Flying clothing will not be worn off the flight line. If the jacket is not worn, the grade insignia will be worn on the shirt (see table 5-1); badges will not be worn.
- 3-6. Description and Materials of Authorized Uniform Items. See table 3-2 for descriptions and materials of clothing items which may be worn with the service and flight uniforms.

#### SECTION B - UTILITY UNIFORMS

3-7. Wear of Utility Uniform. Female CAP members are authorized to alter the male utility uniform and wear it under the same provisions

as the male member. See Section B of chapter 2 for detailed wear instructions.

Figure 3-1. Overcoat, Optional Overcoat, and Raincoat

#### AWARDS, DECORATIONS, AND RIBBONS


- 4-1. Wear of Awards and Decorations. Awards, decorations, and ribbons described in CAPR 39-3 will be worn only by CAP members for whom they have been authorized, and only on the uniforms listed in table 4-1. Awards, decorations, and ribbons will not be worn on the overcoat, topcoat, or raincoat.
- a. Arrangement of Ribbons on the Coat. See table 4-2 and figure 4-2.
- b. Placement of Devices on Ribbons and Medals. See CAPR 39-3.
- 4-2. Foreign Decorations. Foreign decorations are so many and so varied, the number and combinations that may be worn will not be prescribed. However, good taste and judgement must prevail, and the following guide must be used:
- a. Only decorations that have been duly approved by Congress for acceptance and wear by the individual may be worn.
- b. Personnel attending functions sponsored by a foreign nation should, as a courtesy, wear any decorations they have been awarded by that nation.
- c. Sash, sunburst, or neck type decorations will be worn according to the custom of the awarding nation. Not more than one sash,

- sunburst, or foreign neck decoration may be worn at one time.


Figure 4-1. Arrangement Fourrageres and Lanyards

- 4-3. Fourrageres and Lanyards. Not more than one fourragere or lanyard will be worn at one time, and it will be worn on the left shoulder (see figure 4-1).
- 4-4. Military Service Awards. Military service awards may be worn on CAP uniforms. Awards of the Air Force, Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Coast Guard, will be worn in the order prescribed by the awarding service, subject to the following:
- a. In all cases of relative priority, Air Force awards will take precedence.
- b. Awards for wars, campaigns, expeditions, etc. will be worn in chronological sequence.
- c. ROTC ribbons awarded by the military departments may be worn following all other ribbons.
- 4-5. Order of Precedence. Ribbons must be arranged in the order of precedence shown in CAPR 39-3. The ribbon with the highest precedence will be nearest to the lapel on the top row; other ribbons will follow in order of precedence, from right to left. The numbers on the ribbons in figure 4-2 show the order of arrangement.





#### standard to the Chapter 5

### INSIGNIA, BADGES, AND DEVICES

#### SECTION A - GRADE INSIGNIA

5-1. Wear of Grade Insignia. Table 5-1 prescribes the wear of grade insignia. The grade insignia may be worn on the clothing items shown in this table, but will not be worn on

other items. Figures 5-1 through 5-7 illustrate wear of, or describe, officers' and airmen's grade insignia.

### SECTION B - BADGES AND DEVICES

- 5-2. Wear of Badges and Devices. Only those badges and devices described below will be worn on the CAP uniform.
- a. CAP Identification Badge. Two such badges are authorized: One for senior members (figure 5-8) and one for cadets (figure 5-9). The CAP Identification Badge will be worn centered one-half inch above the right breast pocket of the service coat and the shirt when worn as an outer garment.
- b. Lapel, Collar, and Flight Cap Insignia. The letters CAP in oxidized silver metal as described below will be worn on the collar of the shirt when worn as an outer garment, on the lapels of the service coat, and on the flight cap as depicted in figure 5-10.
- c. Service Cap Insignia. Service cap insignia is as depicted in figure 5-11.
- d. Buttons. Oxidized silver color metal buttons of suitable composition and weight, circular and slightly convex with raised rim, bearing the seal of the Civil Air Patrol in clear relief against a horizontally lined background. (Figure 5-12.)

#### e. Aviation Badges:

- (1) Members who have been awarded a CAP aeronautical rating will wear one aviation badge centered one-half inch above the left breast pocket of coats, jackets, and shirts worn as outer garments. When ribbons are worn, the badge will be worn centered one-half inch above the ribbons. (Figure 5-13.)
- (2) One United States military aviation badge, if awarded by military authorities, may be worn centered one-half inch above the CAP identification badge.

#### (3) Foreign badges:

(a) One foreign aviation badge may be worn centered one-half inch above the

CAP identification badge; however, it may not be worn if a U. S. military aviation badge is worn. To be eligible the senior member must have earned the badge through qualification as evidenced in writing by a foreign agency.

(b) Badges acquired as gifts or souvenirs do not qualify as earned badges and will not be worn on the uniform.

#### f. Name Plate:

- (1) The standard CAP name plate is an optional item; however, its wear is encouraged. It will be of black plastic composition, two and seven-eighths inches wide and three-fourths inch high. Manufacture will be of combined white and black components so as to give a non-luster, black plastic surface with white engraved lettering from one-fourth inch to three-eighths inch in height. Edges will be beveled from front to rear to provide a narrow, white border around the entire plate. A metal CAP crest appears approximately one-eighth inch from left edge of the plate. The wearer's last name will be centered on the remainder of the plate.
- (2) It will be worn centered immediately below the CAP identification badge one-half inch below the seam of the right pocket flap of garments having a pocket, on all outer uniform garments except raincoats, overcoats, and topcoats. It may be worn on civilian clothes. (Figure 5-14.)
- g. Shoulder Patches. Either a wing or regional shoulder patch must be worn by all CAP members. Members of the regional staff and NEC members representing regions will wear a regional patch. All other members will wear a wing shoulder patch. Members who are not affiliated with an organization within a wing or region (for example, National Headquarters Membership Unit members) are exempt from this requirement. Only one shoulder patch will be worn, and it will be located one-half inch

below the shoulder seam of the left sleeve of all coats (except raincoats), jackets, shirts worn as outer garments, and flying suits. (Figure 5-15.)

- h. Speciality Insignia. Chaplains, medical officers, nurses, and communicators will wear their speciality insignia centered one-half inch above the left breast pocket of jackets, coats, or shirts worn as outer garments. If ribbons and aviation badges are also worn, the speciality insignia will be worn one-half inch above these. (Figure 5-16.)
- i. Gunnery and Small Arms Qualifying Badges. One Junior National Rifle Association Marksmanship Badge may be worn by cadets when earned as an achievement in accordance with the Civil Air Patrol cadet program. Male cadets will wear the badge with the top edge centered on the left pocket flap of the service


- j. Cadet NCO Leadership Shoulder Insignia. Noncommissioned officer leadership shoulder insignia is worn by Phase II cadets who are appointed to the positions of cadet flight sergeant, cadet first sergeant, cadet academic sergeant, cadet administrative assistant, cadet squad leader, cadet guide, cadet guiden bearer and cadet color guard. The insignia is worn centered on the right shoulder. (Figure 5-17.)
- k. Organizational Emblem. See Table 2-3, Rule 12.






Figure 5-3. Chevrons Denoting Senior Member Airman Grades

Airmen's grade insignia (chevrons) will be sewn on the sleeves, centered between the elbow and shoulder seam on long sleeve garments and centered between bottom edge of sleeve and shoulder seam on short sleeve garments (see figure 5-3).







Figure 5-2. Regular and Miniature Sizes of Senior Member Grade Insignia





Figure 5-4. Shoulder Strap Insignia of Senior Member Officer Grade




Figure 5-6. Wear of Cadet Officer Grade on the Shoulders




Figure 5-7. Chevrons Denoting Cadet Airmen Grades






Figure 5-11. Service Cap Insignia, Seniors and Cadets




Figure 5-13. Aviation Badges




Figure 5-16. Speciality Insignia

#### Chapter 6

### THE CAP BLAZER

- 6-1. Men. The CAP blazer and slacks combination (figure 6-1) may be worn by all male members of the Civil Air Patrol regardless of grade. It consists of:
- a. Coat. Blazer type, semiform-fitted, drape, single-breasted, two-button model with one breast patch pocket, two lower patch pockets, and rear vent. Material is dark blue flannel or tropical worsted. It is ornamented by the CAP crest (figure 6-3), attached or sewn to the breast pocket.
- b. Trousers. Medium gray flannel or tropical worsted material, full cut, straight hanging, pleated, cuffed.
  - c. Shirt. White, dress type.
  - d. Necktie. Silver-gray.
- e. Footwear. Shoes, black; socks, black or dark blue.
- 6-2. Women. The CAP blazer and skirt combination (figure 6-2) may be worn by all female members of the Civil Air Patrol regardless of grade. It consists of:

- a. Coat. Form-fitted, three-button, commercial model blazer with one breast patch pocket and two lower patch pockets. Material is dark blue flannel, tropical worsted, or similar commercial blend. It is ornamented by the CAP crest (figure 6-3), attached or sewn to the breast pocket.
- b. Skirt. Full pleated of medium gray flannel, tropical worsted, or similar commercial blend.
- c. Blouse. White, simple design, without ruffles or excessive ornamentation.
- d. Footwear. Either black tailored pumps with neutral nylon hose or black leather loafers with blue anklets, as appropriate.
- 6-3. When Worn. The blazer may be worn during any season of the year. It is encouraged for wear at CAP social occasions in lieu of the service uniform. It may be worn without restriction on non-CAP occasions.
